UMUROA TO GO

BW Offshore's floating production, storage and offloading vessel UMUROA has finally disconnected from the Tui oilfield offshore New Zealand where it has been stranded for more than a year. The FPSO has been marooned at the field since November 2019 when the field operator and owner - Tamarind Taranaki, a subsidiary of Malaysia's Tamarind Resources - becoming financially insolvent. The country's Environmental Protection Authority then prevented BW Offshore from disconnecting the floater and sailing away. A local court finally ruled in November 2020 against the FPSO being held, and proceedings began for its disconnection. The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) said on 6 May 2021 that the last of the nine anchor chains that kept the floater moored was disconnected and the vessel was now able to depart the field and New Zealand waters. The costs of the disconnection and demobilisation of the FPSO will be covered by the MBIE. The final costs have yet to be determined.



LIGHT HOUSE OF THE WEEK - RANGITOTO LIGHT

Position: 36° 46' 32.39" S 174° 49' 11.99" E

Characteristics: FI R 12s

Range: 7 nm

Structure: Red concrete tower, white bands

Rangitoto Lighthouse (also called Rangitoto Beacon) is located on a small islet in McKenzie Bay just off the western end of Rangitoto Island. The lighthouse was built in 1882. In 1905 a light was added for night time visibility.

Rangitoto Beacon was the first lighthouse to be built in NZ using Wilson's Portland cement. Because of disagreements between the Auckland Harbour Board and the Marine Department, the light was not lit until 1905. First illuminated by a gas light supplied by the Railways Department, in 1925 the light was replaced with an incandescent lamp. This in turn was replaced in 1926 with an acetone acetylene light. In 1929 an underwater cable was installed from Takapuna and the light was electrified. After a cable fault in 1982 the lighthouse is now powered by solar power. It is a 20-metre-tall white concrete tower with red horizontal bands and has a red beacon at the top. Two lights set back-to-back ensure an alternating beam is thrown out. There is also a siren, which is switched on by the weather station at Mt Victoria.

The bach communities on Rangitoto Island were built in the 1920s and 30's and consist of private holiday dwellings and boatsheds as well as communal facilities such as paths, swimming pool, community hall and tennis courts. Built by families, using the scarce resources of the Depression era, the buildings demonstrate the 'kiwi' do-it-yourself, jack-of-all-trades attitudes of the times.

As a result of a prohibition order on further buildings in 1937, the remnants of the communities reflect this specific time in Auckland's development and as a result they are part of local history involving typical New Zealanders in a unique environment.

Because other bach communities, which were prevalent throughout the country, have virtually disappeared, the Rangitoto bach settlements are irreplaceable artefacts of New Zealand's architectural, and social history and therefore are important beyond their locality.
