2 To encourage an interest in the history of HMNZS Ngapona and maintain a permanent record.


3 To support HMNZS Ngapona if and when required.

- 5 To encourage membership of the Association.


Your membership will help preserve the history of *Ngapona*. An application form is attached.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

On 31st March 1936, work commenced on the lengthening of Calliope Dry-dock to be able to accommodate the new cruisers, *Achilles* and *Leander*. It involved extending the dock floor by 13ft, and widening the recess made in 1927 to fit the liner *Northumberland* by 8ft each side. The dock was increased once more, in 1943, to be able to receive the heavy cruisers of the US Navy.

### **INTERESTING FACT**

HMS *Calliope* was the only one of 14 ships in Apia Harbour, Samoa, to escape the tropical cyclone of 1889. In an heroic act of seamanship Capt Kane navigated his ship out of the harbour entrance in winds of up to 100 knots (130–185 km/h, 80-115 mph) blowing directly into the anchorage. To relieve the strain on the five anchor cables, *Calliope*'s boilers were producing maximum pressure; the engines were being worked "red hot", and the propeller was making 74 revolutions per minute, sufficient for 15 knots (28 km/h) in calmer waters.

There were ten men on the wheel and more below handling relieving tackle on the tiller to assist in maintaining control of the rudder. Taking two hours to travel four cables (740m), the cruiser finally escaped the anchorage into the open sea.

The engineer attributed their success to the superior properties of West Coast coal from New Zealand used to fire the ship's boilers.

On 29 October 1907 *Calliope* became a drill ship at Newcastle upon Tyne for the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, Tyne Division, and served there for over four decades. When finally scrapped in 1953, the steering wheel was presented to the government of Western Samoa.
