THE WHENUA-KI-TE-TONGA - TERRA AUSTRALIS CONFERENCE

This Conference is to be held at the Naval Base 15-17 November 2019, with functions also at the Navy Museum.

The Conference will explore the discovery and exploration of the Southern Lands by both Polynesian and European navigators, and the encounters between these people in the period up to Lieutenant James Cook's voyage in HMB Endeavour. The Conference is co-hosted by the Captain Cook Society and Friends of the RNZN Museum, and includes a generous discount for membership. SHIP OF THE WEEK – AOTEAROA

Aotearoa will operate as a fleet tanker. The 173-meter ship will also be ice-strengthened and winterised for operations in Antarctica. The ship cost \$493 million to build. *Aotearoa* was launched at Hyundai Heavy Industries's Ulsan shipyard in South Korea on 24th April 2019. She is now being fitted out before her formal naming ceremony in Ulsan, South Korea, next month. The commissioning of the ship will take place at the Devonport Naval Base in Auckland in early 2020.





DID YOU KNOW?

On 11 September 1970, HMNZS *Tui* (1970), ex-USNS *Charles H Davis*, was commissioned a the Brooklyn Navy Yard, New York, USA. *Tui* was built by Christy Corporation at Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin and taken into the United States Naval Service (USNS) as USNS *Charles H. Davis* [AGOR-5] in January 1963. As one of the Conrad class of seven oceanographic research ships, utilized on a 'pool basis', *Charles H. Davis* had been in reserve for some years before being leased to the RNZN. *Tui* was leased at no cost for a period of five years, which was later extended, before being gifted to New Zealand to serve in the RNZN for nearly 28 years in total. *Tui* went into reserve as in 1998 was judged as being well past her economic life and was stripped and towed to Whangarei to be scuttled and used as an artificial reef for recreational divers.
