## SHIP OF THE WEEK - HMNZS HINAU (T17)

HMNZS *Hinau*, built in Auckland by Senior Foundry Co in 1942 was a composite minesweeper fitted for magnetic mines. The design was based on the WWI Castle Class trawlers. Displacement of 625 BRT and a length of 41.4m, *Hinau* was one of 13 completed of the 17 ordered in the class.


HMNZS *Hinau* served at Wellington and was placed in reserve in 1946 and sold in 1955 to be used as a breakwater at Kaiaua, Firth of Thames, where this photo was taken on 13 November 2013.

On the pennant the motto, 'Kia mataara', translates as 'Be alert'.



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

On 30 December 1940, Cabinet approved the construction of an anti-submarine boom from North Head to Bastion Point, but it was not constructed immediately due to the unavailability of suitable piles. Work finally started in March 1942, and the US took over construction when they arrived a few months later, and it was completed by September 1942. The boom involved 1,050 hardwood piles and the nets were anchored with 200 five-ton concrete blocks.
